

BioDiversity - Parish Council Policy and Action Plan

The Parish Council is considering what it can do to contribute to Biodiversity through the development of a Biodiversity Policy and Action Plan.

What is Biodiversity

According to Defra (Biodiversity 2020), Biodiversity is the variety of all life on Earth. It includes all species of animals and plants – everything that is alive on our planet.

Biodiversity is important for its own sake and has its own intrinsic value. It is the building block of our 'ecosystems' that in turn provide us with a wide range of goods and services that support our economic and social wellbeing. These include essentials such as food, fresh water and clean air, but also less obvious services such as protection from natural disasters, regulation of our climate, and purification of our water or pollination of our crops

What can the Council do?

Immediate actions could include:

- reviewing what biodiversity or nature recovery plans are already in place from other local authorities, e.g. potential for jointly-supported wildlife corridors.
- making contact with local voluntary groups working on nature conservation.
- carrying out a biodiversity audit within the village, potentially involving residents in a "BioBlitz"
- gathering expert advice on possible actions in support of biodiversity, such as from Caring for God's Acre and the Eco Church initiative in respect of churchyards
- considering how the actions of residents and other village organizations could be integrated with its own planning.

The Council will also draw as appropriate on work being carried out by Buckinghamshire Council which one of five areas in the country to trial the development of a Local Nature Recovery Strategy (LNRS).

LNRS are a new way of helping nature by identifying which characteristics are most important at a local level to focus action and investment.

The aim is to help nature and people flourish together.

The LNRS draws on work already done locally, such as through the <u>Buckinghamshire</u> and <u>Milton Keynes Natural Environment Partnership</u>

A Parish Council Policy

The object of a Council Biodiversity Policy would be to work towards conserving and enhancing the biodiversity within the Council's area. Possible items for inclusion within a Council Policy/Action Plan are:

- to consider the potential impact on biodiversity represented by planning applications.
- to manage village land (e.g. verges and common land) using environmentally friendly practices that will promote biodiversity, e.g. only essential cutting and removal of vegetation, unnecessary application of chemicals and careful timing of maintenance work.
- to encourage and support businesses and other organisations within the village to manage their areas of responsibility with biodiversity in mind.
- to support residents' activities to enhance and promote biodiversity.
- where feasible, to involve the community in biodiversity projects on its land including for example tree planting, wildflower meadows, birdbox making.

An example of what might be included in such a Policy is shown in the table below, along with ideas for an associated Action Plan.

Input from the Village

Developing a realistic, manageable Biodiversity Policy and Plan requires support from the village. As a minimum understanding that it might involve some additional expenditure, but more importantly ideas and active input from village residents and organizations.
