Working Together to Tackle Rural Crime

Thames Valley Police have today (1st April) launched their own Police Tractor. The vehicle has been loaned to the Force by John Deere and Farrol Ltd and shall be used by the Police to promote the work the Force is doing to tackle rural crime. The tractor has been fitted with a number of security devices to demonstrate the type of products which can be purchased to help prevent the theft of tractors and other agricultural vehicles.

Inspector Emma Garside said "we intend to have the tractor with us at a number of our community events throughout the coming months. It is hugely eye catching piece of kit which we hope will get people talking. We want to demonstrate how seriously the Police are taking their responsibilities to reduce the numbers of stolen plant in the countryside. Preventing this kind of offence is far easier than detecting it. You wouldn't leave a £70,000 car insecure in the middle of no where and expect it to still be there in the morning. The same attitude must now be applied to agricultural vehicles too.

Thames Valley Police are currently offering a 20% discount on the CESAR product. CESAR is a specially-designed product that offers protection from theft by making it so difficult for a thief to sell-on or change the identity of a piece of equipment that it's not worth stealing it. Offenders bought to justice

Tristan Hockley was arrested by Hertfordshire police on Friday night as a result of him being

witnessed stealing a caravan. Hockley was driving a van that had been stolen from a non dwelling in Brill on 31/1. He was charged with Theft of Caravan, Disqualified Driving, and driving without insurance. He has been remanded in prison until 21st March. The caravan had been fitted with a tracking device which greatly assisted with its recovery.
